CHAPTER - I

Please Note

1. The CET application form sent to a candidate by post is not transferable.
2. Within Karnataka, the candidates will get their admission tickets through their schools and colleges. The candidates residing outside Karnataka will get it by "Speed Post".
3. The candidates should read the instructions printed on the OMR answer sheets before they start answering.
4. The candidates have to mark the right answers on the objective type OMR answer sheets using a blue or black ink ball point pens only.
5. The candidates will be allowed to carry home a replica of the filled answer sheet after the completion of each session of the test, which the candidates are advised to preserve for one year.
6. A candidate or a parent can inspect the answer scripts and all other related documents of any other candidate whose performance is suspected by paying a prescribed fees.

1. INTRODUCTION

The Karnataka Common Entrance Test 2003 is being conducted for the purpose of determining the eligibility / merit, for admission of students to the I year or I semester of full time courses in Medical, Dental, Ayurveda, Unani, Homoeopathy, Naturopathy, Yoga, Engineering, Technology and Architecture courses in the institutions within the State of Karnataka.

2. MODE OF CONDUCTING THE TEST

In order to obtain admission to any of the professional courses through CET Cell, a student will have to appear in the Common Entrance Test which will be conducted by the Common Entrance Test Cell, Bangalore (Herein after referred to as the CET Cell). The said test shall be conducted at 40 places, spread over Karnataka (See **Appendix-I** at Page-18 for details). The schedule of the written test is as follows :

* For admission to Architecture course, passing an Aptitude Test conducted by CET Cell is compulsory. The Aptitude Test will be held **ONLY** in Bangalore. The centre for writing the aptitude test for the interested candidates will be mentioned in their 'CET-2003' admission tickets.

Based on the performance of the candidates in the test, merit or rank list will be prepared and published. (see Item - 5 of Chapter - II at Page - 15) The candidates will be allowed to select seats in the order of their merit i.e., rank during the seat selection process.

In view of the Judgement of Hon'ble Supreme Court of India dated 31-10-2002 in T. M. A. Pai Foundation case, the details relating to sharing of seats for Karnataka students, seat selection procedure, schedule of seat selection process and fee structure for various courses and colleges is subject to final decision of the Government and the rules / orders passed by the Government in this regard and also the orders of the Hon'ble Court, which will be notified in a separate booklet and the same will be made available to all candidates who appear for the Common Entrance Test - 2003 at the respective CET examination centres.

The candidates from outside Karnataka can also write the Common Entrance Test - 2003. However, the seats in Government / University / Aided courses in aided colleges will not be offered to such candidates. As regards seats in un-aided colleges, the details of seats available, if any, and the procedure of allotment, if seats are available, will be notified subsequently and will be subject to the above condition.

3. WHO CAN APPLY ?

A candidate who has passed the second year Pre-University or XII standard or equivalent examination (herein after referred to as the "qualifying examination" or "Q.E." for short) with Physics and Mathematics alongwith Chemistry / Bio-Technology / Computer Science / Electronics / Information Science / Biology as optional subjects with English as one of the languages of study and obtained atleast 45% marks in the optional subjects is eligible for Engineering / Technology / Architecture courses. (35% in case of SC/ST/Category-1 candidates) Candidates who want to opt for Architecture course are required to pass an Aptitude Test also.

Since, the merit order / rank will be prepared based on the performance of the candidates in qualifying examination and Common Entrance Test, by considering the marks in equal proportions, the candidates claiming eligibility for Government seats (those who satisfy any of the eligibility conditions stipulated in Item - 7 of Chapter - I of the brochure) should have studied CHEMISTRY as one of the optional subjects in the qualifying examination.

A candidate who has passed the Q.E. with Physics, Chemistry and Biology as optional subjects and English as one of the languages of study and obtained atleast 50% marks in the PCB group is eligible for Medical / Dental / Ayurveda / Homoeopathy / Unani / Naturopathy / Yoga courses. Provided that for Dental course, the candidate must have secured 50% of marks in aggregate in optional subjects and English language. (40% in case of SC/ST/Category-1 candidates).

(The SC/ST/Category-1 eligibility criteria is applicable to persons of Karnataka origin who are claiming eligibility for Government seats under clauses (a), (b), (f), (h), (j), (k) and (l) of Item - 7 of Chapter - I).

Further, the candidate seeking admission to Medical / Dental / Ayurveda / Homoeopathy / Unani / Naturopathy / Yoga courses should have completed the age of seventeen years as on 31st December of 2003.

Not only a candidate who has passed the qualifying examination with requisite marks but also a student who has appeared for the Q.E. and who is expecting the results is also eligible to apply for the Common Entrance Test. The candidates who are appearing for Karnataka PUC annual 2003 as freshers need not furnish the Q.E. marks as it is obtained directly from the Directorate of PUE. The repeaters, CBSE, ISC and other candidates appearing for the test should submit a photocopy of the qualifying examination marks card on or before **10.06.2003**, failing which no rank will be assigned to them.

The candidates who are not eligible for government seats are not required to produce the Q.E. marks card, since their merit / ranks will be determined solely on the basis of their performance in the Common Entrance Test.

4. HOW AND WHERE TO GET THE BROCHURE WITH APPLICATION FORM?

Candidates who have studied or studying their PUC or XII Std. in educational institutions within Karnataka should get their brochure with application forms by submitting a demand draft for Rs.500/- to the Principals of the institutions in which they had studied or studying or appeared for the II PU or XII std. examination. (Rs. 350/- in case of SC / ST / Category-1 candidates). The Principals of all the Schools and Colleges in Karnataka teaching PUC or XII std. including CBSE & ISC syllabi have been requested to collect the filled application forms and forward the same to the CET Cell both from freshers & repeater students. The last day for submission of D.D.s to concerned Principals will be **15.03.2003**.

Candidates who have studied or studying XII std. or intermediate or pre-degree or equivalent examination outside Karnataka in any state within India, can get the brochure with application only through speed post, directly from the CET Cell, by sending a cloth lined self-addressed envelope of 25 cms x 30 cms size and a demand draft for Rs. 550/- drawn in favour of the "Special Officer, CET Cell, Bangalore" on any Bank in Bangalore and candidates residing outside India can get the brochures by sending a demand draft for Rs. 1000/-. The envelope in which the said two items are sent should be boldly superscribed with the words "REQUEST FOR CET 2003 BROCHURE" and should be sent individually by "SPEED POST" only. The last day for receipt of request for brochure with application forms will be **15.03.2003**.

APPLY THROUGH INTERNET : This time, to facilitate the candidates from both Karnataka and outside Karnataka to apply for 'CET-2003', the application and brochure is also made available on the CET Website : <http://kar.nic.in/cet>. The candidates can apply through Internet, by following the procedure detailed below :

- Open the CET Website <http://kar.nic.in/cet> - Go to Item - 5 of Chapter - I of the brochure - Read the instructions detailed for filling the application form.
- Go to the application part - Start entering your data / particulars in the application form - For any doubts regarding filling the form, open the brochure for clarification.
- After all entries are over, click SUBMIT - Inturn you will get a confirmation from the computer for acceptance of your application form through a number.
- Download the filled application form on an A4 size executive bond paper - Affix your passport size photograph, preferably a black & white, in the space provided - Sign on both the places reserved for candidate's signature on the downloaded filled application form - Ask your parents / guardian to sign on the application form in the space provided.
- Enclose the demand draft purchased as the application fee (as the case may be) to the downloaded filled application form.
- Keep both the demand draft and the downloaded filled application form in an envelope addressed to "The Special Officer, Common Entrance Test Cell, Sampige Road, 18th Cross, Malleshwaram, Bangalore - 560 003." - Send the envelope by 'Speed Post' only.
- The details of the enclosed demand draft should be filled at the space provided in the application form.

Note : The downloaded filled application form should accompany the application fee in the form of demand draft. Mere applications without demand drafts towards the application fee will not be considered and rejected without further intimation.

The data pertaining to Karnataka students studying II PUC during the academic year 2002-2003 and also that of the repeater candidates have been procured from the PUE Directorate and stored in the CET computers. The data pertaining to the CBSE and ISC students have also been obtained from the respective schools. Based on that data, the lists of probable candidates have been furnished to the principals of PU colleges and CBSE and ISC schools in Karnataka to facilitate them to deliver the brochures with applications to the students and then to collect the filled applications. The admission tickets of CET 2003 will also be sent to the schools and colleges in the state of Karnataka on or before **15.05.2003**.

5. HOW TO FILL THE APPLICATION FORM?

The application form which is common to all students seeking admission to professional courses through CET cell is enclosed with this brochure. The candidates should fill the application form using a BALL POINT PEN in capital letters.

The candidate can appear only for Physics, Chemistry and Maths or only for Physics, Chemistry and Biology or he can appear for all the four subjects. But the selection of subject need not be indicated in the application form, as arrangements would have been made for writing all the four subjects.

For the benefit of the candidates, itemwise instructions are given below. Wherever codes are given, fill the boxes in the application form with the appropriate codes:

1. **Name of the Candidate :** The candidate should fill the name as it is in the XII Standard or PUC marks card. There should be no variation in form or spelling.
2. **Name of the Mother :** Mother's name in full should be filled in the space provided.
3. **Name of the Father :** Father's name should correspond to the form and spelling in the qualifying examination marks card.
4. **Date of Birth :** The Date of birth should correspond to the entry in the 10th standard marks card.

5. **Sex** : Tick the appropriate box.
6. **Nationality** : If Indian ; indicate 1

7. **Mother Tongue** : Mention your mother tongue in the space provided.

9. **Native State** : Refer State Codes, District Codes and also Taluk Codes in **Appendix - II**. If State Code is "01" i.e., Karnataka, then indicate **Native District** code and **Native Taluk** code as per **Appendix - II**.
10. **State appeared for SSLC / equivalent** : For State Codes refer **Appendix - II**.
11. **State appeared for II PUC / equivalent** : For State and District Codes refer **Appendix - II**.
12. **Name of the place where you wish to write CET 2003** : Candidates who have studied the Q.E. within Karnataka should write CET in a test centre within the district in which the candidate studied PUC or XII std.
The candidates who have passed or appeared for the XII std. or qualifying examination outside Karnataka can appear for CET 2003 in the following places only : **Bangalore, Belgaum, Bellary, Bidar, Gulbarga, Mangalore, Mysore, Raichur, Tumkur.** (Please see **Appendix - I**).
Indicate the place where you wish to write CET 2003.
- Do you wish to write the Aptitude Test ?** : For admission to Architecture course, the candidates should compulsorily pass an Aptitude Test conducted by CET Cell. The Aptitude Test will be conducted **ONLY** for candidates who are interested in opting for Architecture course. **Tick the appropriate box.**
13. **Correct Postal Address** : The address part of the application as filled by the candidates will be scanned and the same will be printed on the 'CET 2003' admission tickets. Therefore, the candidates should carefully write their full postal address in block letters to which all correspondence can be speedily reached. City name, State and Pin Code should invariably be filled.
If telephone / mobile phone is available, the number may be furnished along with STD code in the box provided. If not available, mention any available contact number.
14. **Quota** : If you are claiming eligibility for Government seats indicate '**K**' ; if not indicate '**N**'.
- Items 15, 16, 17, 18, 19 and 20 are meant only for candidates claiming eligibility for Government seats.
15. **Clause Code** : If you are claiming eligibility for Government seats, indicate the Code of the appropriate **CLAUSE** as per Item - 7 of Chapter - I of the brochure from (a) to (1).
16. **Are you appearing for Karnataka 2nd PUC Annual 2003?**
If you are appearing for Karnataka 2nd PUC Annual 2003, mention '**YES**' ; if not mention '**NO**'.
If the candidate is claiming eligibility for Government seats and if the qualifying examination is other than Karnataka 2nd PUC annual 2003, then a photocopy of the qualifying examination marks card on which the admission ticket number (hereinafter called the CET No.) is boldly written should be sent to the CET Cell on or before **10-06-2003**, failing which no rank will be assigned in the result sheets. However, the candidates will be assigned ranks subsequently. See box at Page - 16 about intermediary ranks.

17. **PUC Student number** : Mention the 11 digit number assigned individually to all PU students by the PUE Directorate of Karnataka. (For example : 21AS0250145).
18. **Years of study in Karnataka** : Mention the number of years of study in the state of Karnataka between 1st and 12th Std.

Claiming seat under rural category ? - If you have studied 10 full academic years from 1st and 10th Std. in places other than the places mentioned in **Appendix - IV** at Page - 21, mention '**YES**'; if not mention '**NO**'.

Claiming seat under Kannada medium ? - If you have studied 10 full academic years between 1st and 10th Std. in Kannada medium in the state of Karnataka, mention '**YES**'; if not mention '**NO**'.

19. If you are claiming caste income reservation benefit, indicate respective Category code given below and the Caste name in the box provided :

21. **Study Details** : Candidates must furnish the academic study details between 1st to 12th Std. mentioning the full name and address of the institutions studied & respective telephone numbers, if available with STD codes, classes studied, number of years studied and year of passing. If the study details are not complete, the application will be rejected.
22. **Seat selection details of the previous years through CET Cell** : If you have selected a Medical / Dental / Engineering seat through CET Cell in the previous years, then mention the year of admission, CET number, Category opted, College opted, Course opted and the reason for appearing in the Common Entrance Test - 2003.

If you are applying for 'CET-2003' through Internet, then mention the demand draft particulars in the space provided in the application form. If the demand draft particulars are not filled properly in the downloaded application form, then the application will not be considered for further processing and the same will be rejected without further intimation.

23. **Candidate's Photograph** : The candidate is required to firmly paste a recent passport size photograph preferably black and white within the space provided on the application form using gum. Do not use stapler or pin. The photograph should not cover the signature area below it. After filling the application form, the candidate and one of the parents / guardian should sign in the places provided.

The candidate should invariably sign on both the places on the application form.

Note: This time, the filled application form will be scanned as it is and it will become part of the candidate's data in the computers. Therefore, the candidates are advised not to enclose any documents / papers in support of their claims to the filled application form. Also, the candidates are advised not to make any stray marks on the application form.

6. WHERE TO SUBMIT THE FILLED APPLICATION FORM ?

Candidates who have received the brochure with application forms through their schools or colleges should submit their filled applications in the respective schools or colleges on or before **10.04.2003**.

Candidates residing outside Karnataka who have procured their brochure with applications through speed post should submit their filled applications individually by "Speed Post" directly to the CET Cell on or before **10.04.2003**.

Candidates who apply through internet should also send their downloaded filled application forms directly to the CET Cell by "Speed Post" alongwith the prescribed fee in the form of demand draft on or before **10.04.2003**.

In order to avoid any complications, the candidates residing out side Karnataka are advised to send their filled application forms individually, only through "Speed Post" and not by any other mode.

Candidates who have submitted their applications through the schools and colleges should collect their admission tickets from the respective schools and colleges. Candidates from outside Karnataka who submit their applications through Speed Post will get their admission tickets to their home addresses as filled by them in their application forms, by Speed Post. The admission tickets will be sent to the respective schools and colleges and also to candidates residing out side Karnataka around **15.05.2003**.

ASSIGNMENT OF EXAM CENTRES AND ADMISSION TICKETS

Candidates who have studied the Q.E. within Karnataka should write CET in a test centre within the district in which the candidate studied PUC or XII std. If CET test centres are located in more than one place in a district, the candidate can choose one of the places. If there are more than one test centre in a place, then the decision to assign the test centre will rest with the CET Cell and the CET Cell will decide on random basis the test centre of a candidate.

Candidates who have studied the Q.E. outside Karnataka can write CET only in **Bangalore, Belgaum, Bellary, Bidar, Gulbarga, Mangalore, Mysore, Raichur, Tumkur** test centres. Such candidates can choose any of the above said places for the test. They have to mention one of the above said places in Item - 12 in the application form.

If a candidate fails to mention the place of the test or if he writes a place name other than the above said nine places, then he will be assigned a test centre in **Bangalore**.

For admission to Architecture course, the candidates should compulsorily pass an Aptitude Test conducted by CET Cell in a centre only in **Bangalore**. The Aptitude Test will be conducted ONLY for the candidates who are interested in opting for Architecture course on **02.06.2003** between 3.00 p.m. to 4.30 p.m. The venue for the aptitude test will be notified to the candidates who wish to take the test, in their CET admission tickets.

What are Government Seats ?

The Government seats are the seats available in Government, University and Aided courses in Aided colleges. The Government seats will also include certain percentage of seats available to the Government in Un-aided minority & non-minority institutions, in accordance with the judgement of the Hon'ble Supreme Court of India in T. M. A. Pai Foundation case.

7. ELIGIBILITY FOR GOVERNMENT SEATS

Candidates who satisfy one of the following conditions laid down under Rule 5 qualify for admission to Government seats. Each condition is specified as a clause and is individually referred by a code. The Clauses and codes are as follows :

The candidate should have studied and passed in one or more Government or Government recognised educational institutions located in the State of Karnataka for a minimum period of SEVEN academic years commencing from I standard to II PUC/12th standard as on 1st July of the year in which the Entrance Test is held and has appeared and passed SSLC/10th standard or II PUC/12th standard examination from Karnataka State.

a

In case of the candidate who had taken more than one year to pass a class or standard, the years of academic study is counted as one year only.

The candidate should have studied and passed I and II year Pre-University Examination or equivalent examination within the State of Karnataka from an Educational Institution run or recognised by the State Government and that either of the parents should have studied in Karnataka for a minimum period of SEVEN years, which should be evident from the certificates issued by the concerned institution/s.

b

In the case of candidates whose mother tongue is Kannada, Tulu or Kodava and who are residing outside the State of Karnataka but within the territory of India as on 1st July of 2003, such candidates should have passed the qualifying examination from an University or Board or any other Institution located outside Karnataka. Provided also that the candidate shall undergo a simple test which shall be conducted by the CET Cell on the day of seat selection to establish his ability to speak, read and write Kannada. The number of seats in the courses and colleges available for the this clause will be notified separately by the Government and the same information will be made available to the candidates lateron. (Horanadu Kannadiga)

c

A candidate whose mother tongue is Kannada, Tulu or Kodava and who resides in disputed Kannada speaking area of South Sholapur or Akkalkot or Jath or Gadhinglaj Taluks of Maharashtra State or Kasargod Taluk of Kerala State. The candidate shall undergo a simple test which shall be conducted by the CET Cell on the day of seat selection to establish his ability to speak, read and write Kannada. The number of seats in the courses and colleges available for the this clause will be notified separately by the Government and the same information will be made available to the candidates lateron. (Gadinadu Kannadiga) **d**

In the case of a candidate who is son or daughter of defence personnel who has worked continuously in Karnataka as on any day, for a minimum period of one year from 1st July of 2002 to 30th June of 2003. The candidate should have studied and passed the qualifying examination from any Government or Government recognised educational institution located in Karnataka. **e**

Son or daughter of serving defence personnel who at the time of joining the defence service had declared his/her home town a place in the State of Karnataka. Proof of such domicile should be obtained and produced by obtaining the extract from the Record Office of the Defence unit. **f**

In the case of a candidate who is a son or daughter of a defence personnel who had served in Karnataka for at least one year and is posted on duty directly to the disturbed areas of Jammu and Kashmir or North-East and whose family is permitted by Defence Authorities to continue to stay in Karnataka. Such candidate should have studied and passed the qualifying examination from any Government or Government recognised educational institution located in Karnataka. **g**

Son or daughter of an ex-servicemen who at the time of joining the defence service had declared a place in Karnataka as his home town, proof of such domicile should be obtained and produced from the "Deputy Director, Department of Sainik Welfare and Resettlement". **h**

In the case of a candidate being a son or daughter of an employee of the Union Government or an employee of the Union or Karnataka State Government Undertaking or Joint Sector Undertaking, who is liable to be transferred anywhere in India as per the terms and conditions of his employment and has worked continuously for at least one year in Karnataka as on any day from 1st July of 2002 to 30th June of 2003 and such candidate has studied and passed the qualifying examination from any Government or Government recognised educational institutions located in Karnataka. **i**

Son or daughter of a working or retired employee of the Union Government or employee of Union or Karnataka State Government undertaking or Joint Sector undertaking where such employee;

- had declared to the employer at the time of joining service any place in Karnataka to be his home town; and
- had studied in any Government or Government recognised educational institution or institutions located in Karnataka for not less than seven years at any time between 1st std. and 12th std., or Pre-University Examination; and
- was or is liable to be transferred anywhere in India as per the terms and conditions of his employment.

j

Son or daughter of Members of Parliament elected from Karnataka. **k**

Son or daughter of serving or retired employee :

- belonging to All India Service of Karnataka cadre; and
- of the Karnataka State Government,

who has served or is serving outside the State of Karnataka during the period corresponding to Candidate's study outside the State from 1st std. to II PUC or XII std. examination can be added to make up the seven year study within Karnataka as required under clause (a) above. **l**

N.B. : Son or daughter in the various clauses of Item - 7 (Rule - 5) means only natural born son or daughter. Only Indian nationals are eligible to apply for a seat under clauses 7(a) to 7(l).

The Kannada language test and related document verification for the candidates claiming eligibility for seats earmarked for Horanadu Kannadiga and Gadinadu Kannadiga candidates, will be conducted when they come for seat selection process. The allotment order will be issued only after the verification of original documents submitted in support of the claim during seat selection process.

Eligibility for admission to candidates from outside the state of Karnataka (those who do not satisfy any of the conditions laid down for eligibility for Government seats in Item - 7 of Chapter - I of the brochure) is the same as mentioned in Item - 3 of Chapter - I of the brochure. However, the candidates from outside Karnataka can write the Common Entrance Test - 2003 and the seats in Government / University / Aided courses in aided colleges will not be offered to such candidates. As regards seats in un-aided colleges, the details of seats available, if any, and the procedure of allotment, if seats are available, will be notified subsequently and will be subject to final decision of the Government and the rules / orders passed by the Government in this regard and also the orders of the Hon'ble Court.

8. RESERVATION OF SEATS IN FAVOUR OF CERTAIN CATEGORY OF CANDIDATES

(1) (a) Candidates,

- (i) who have participated in Republic Day Camp conducted by the Directorate General of NCC, New Delhi from Karnataka and who possess at least 'B' certificate under NCC obtained during the five year period of study in Karnataka between 8th to 12th standards; or
- (ii) who have participated in the following camps conducted by the Directorate General of NCC, New Delhi from Karnataka and who possess at least 'B' certificate under NCC obtained during the five year period of study in Karnataka between 8th to 12th standards, namely;

 - (ac) Basic Leadership Camp (Girls) (ad) Vayu Sainik Camp
 - (ae) Nau Sainik Camp ; or

Provided that the candidates referred to in sub clause(i) shall be considered first before considering candidates referred to in sub clause (ii) who will be considered before considering candidates referred to in sub clause (iii) above:

Provided further that candidates possessing 'B' certificate and adjudged BEST CADET in camps mentioned in sub clause (i) shall have precedence over all other candidates seeking admission under that sub clause and the candidates adjudged BEST CADET in camps mentioned in sub clause (ii) shall have precedence over all other candidates seeking admission under that sub clause.

(b) Candidates,

- (i) who have represented the country and won medals, cups or plates in any of the international events specified in **Appendix - III** during five year period of study in Karnataka between 8th and 12th Standards.
- (ii) who have represented Karnataka State in national level events specified in **Appendix - III** and won medals, cups or plates in games and sports during five year period of study in Karnataka between 8th and 12th Standards; and
- (iii) who have represented Karnataka State in any sports and games in the national level events specified in **Appendix - III** during five year period of study in Karnataka between 8th and 12th Standards.

- (2) Reservation is made in favour of candidates belonging to the scheduled castes, scheduled tribes and other backward classes of citizens under categories I, 2A, 2B, 3A, 3B in accordance with Government Order No. SWL 251 BCA 94, dated 31st Jan., 1995.

Production of a "Caste Certificate/Caste Income Certificate" issued by the Tahasildar of the concerned Taluk in the prescribed form, in support of the claim is mandatory for selecting a seat under reserved category.

Provided that only candidates of Karnataka origin and who are claiming eligibility for Government seats in accordance with clause (a), (b), (f), (h), (j), (k) and (l) of Rule - 5 shall be eligible to claim the benefit of reservation under this sub-rule. The candidates claiming eligibility for Government seats under clauses (c), (d), (e), (g) and (i) are not eligible to claim the benefit of reservation.

- (3) The interse merit determined under Rule - 6 (Please see Item - 5 of Chapter - II) will remain the same for the purpose of eligibility and benefit of reservation under Item - 8 of Chapter - I.
- (4) 15% of the Government seats will be reserved horizontally in favour of rural candidates who have studied for 10 full academic years from 1st Standard to 10th Standard in educational institutions situated in places in the state of Karnataka other than Larger urban area, Smaller urban area or Transitional area as mentioned in Karnataka Municipalities Act, 1964 or Karnataka Municipalities Corporations Act, 1976 in accordance with the Government Order No. ED 01 TEC 2002, Bangalore, dated 01-02-2002 and the eligibility criteria shall be as defined in the Karnataka Reservation of Appointments of Posts in the Civil services of the State for Rural Candidates Act, 2000 (Karnataka Act 1 of 2001). - Please see **Appendix - IV** at Page - 21.
- (5) 5% of the Government seats will be reserved reserved in favour of the Kannada medium candidates who have studied 10 full academic years in Kannada medium from 1st Standard to 10th Standard in educational institutions located in Karnataka, run or recognised by the Government of Karnataka. (As per Government Notification No. ED 55 TEC 2001 Bangalore, dated 27-06-2001).
- (6) If any seat reserved in favour of candidates belonging to any of the categories referred to above is not filled up due to non-availability of eligible candidates belonging to such category, the reservation to that extent will stand reduced and will be transferred to the general merit category.

N.B. : Son or daughter for the purpose of reservation means only natural born son or daughter.

CHAPTER - II

MORE ABOUT THE WRITTEN TEST

1. SYLLABUS

As already said, the candidate has to face a written test to qualify for the admission to Government seats. The question papers will be based on the I and II PUC syllabi prescribed for and applicable to the students appearing for the April 2003 annual examination conducted by the Directorate of Pre-University Education, Karnataka State.

2. DURATION, QUESTION PAPER AND ANSWER SHEETS

Each question paper will be of 70 minutes duration and will be of objective type. Each question paper will contain 60 questions and each question will have four options. The candidate will have to make use of an optical mark reader (OMR) sheet which will be supplied at the beginning of each session to mark the correct answers. A specimen of the OMR sheet printed on an ordinary paper is given in Page-14. More details about the purpose and use of OMR answer sheet is given at Page-15.

Each question will carry one mark. The candidate is expected to attempt all the 60 questions to secure the highest marks. In other words there is no choice among the questions.

The question paper in each subject will be in 16 versions. This is done by shuffling the questions and the place of the correct answers. The version code of the question paper would have been boldly printed on the facing sheet of the question paper. The version codes used in each subject will be from A - 1 to A - 4, B - 1 to B - 4, C - 1 to C - 4 and D - 1 to D - 4. The version of the question papers in different subjects given to a student will be different and will not be the same.

Among the answers provided against a question only one option will be correct. The candidate should fill only one circle against a question. **A wrong answer will end up with a negative mark.** A quarter mark will be deducted if the answer is wrong and one mark will be deducted if more than one answer is marked or filled to a question. The candidates will have to mark the answers on the answer sheets using blue or black ink ball point pens.

The answer sheet comprises of two sheets. The top sheet which is meant to be scanned for the purpose of valuation. The bottom sheet is meant to be carried home by the candidate after the examination. The bottom sheet is coated with a special kind of chemical. When the candidate fills the circles on the top sheet, the pressure on the bottom sheet will create a replica of the top sheet. After the examination, the invigilator will detach the bottom sheet from the top sheet at the perforations on the left side and hand over the bottom replica to the candidate and the candidate is free to carry it home.

Optical Mark Reader sheets as Answer Sheets

A model of the Optical Mark Reader sheet herein after referred to as OMR sheet that will be used for marking the answers by the candidates is given at Page-14. The need for the replica has compelled us to design OMR sheet in such a way that all the information and the answers are marked only on one side. The top portion of the sheet is meant for furnishing the particulars about the candidates and the question booklet given to them. The bottom portion is meant for marking the answers. The candidate is required to fill the name, the CET No., the version code of the question booklet given to him in the exam hall. The space meant for the subject would have been pre-marked. The square blocks in each item is meant for filling by the candidate in capital letters and numbers. The circles corresponding to the letters or numbers are meant to be filled using ball point pens.

Why Ball Point Pens ?

Remember, we are allowing the candidates to carry home a replica or facsimile of the answer sheets and the answer paper comes in a set of two sheets. When you shade the top sheet, the pressure will create a dark mark on the bottom sheet on the corresponding circle. If a pen with a nib is used, the pressure on the top sheet will not be sufficient to activate the chemical on the bottom sheet. On the other hand, a ball point pen exerts sufficient pressure to convert the bottom sheet chemical into a dark spot. That is why we want you to use a ball point pen only.

Precautions to be taken while filling the top portion of OMR answer sheet

Please study the specimen OMR answer sheet given at Page-14 carefully and familiarise. You are also advised to have the photocopies of the specimen and practice on them. A wrong entry may drastically affect your performance in the test and there is no way to set the things right at a later stage.

The top portion of the OMR answer sheet will have 4 items to be filled, viz., name of the candidate, CET No., question booklet version code and question booklet serial number. Of the four items, the entries pertaining to 'CET No.' and 'question booklet version code' are the very crucial ones. In the absence of the correct CET number by filling the correct circles, the computer will not be able to link the marks scored in an answer paper to the candidate for the purpose of ranking. In other words, when the scoring in different subjects is done by the computer, the subject in which the candidate has not filled the CET No. properly will get left out and the computer will show the candidate as absent and therefore, the candidate will not get a ranking.

Entering the 'question booklet version code' properly by shading the right circles is also equally crucial. The computer would have been programmed to search for the correct answers depending upon the version. So, if the candidate were to make use of a question booklet of one version and enter wrongly some other version code number or leave the space unfilled, then the computer will search for correct answers in the wrong version or will abandon the search. Even if the candidate had marked the correct answers the computer will not account for it as it would be searching for the correct answers for the version filled. So, the candidates are requested to be very careful while shading or filling the circles pertaining to CET No. and the question booklet version codes.

Precautions in filling the answers on bottom portion of OMR Answer sheet

On the bottom portion of the OMR answer sheet there are 60 rows corresponding to sixty questions. Against each question number, four circles are provided corresponding to four options in the question paper. The candidate is required to fill only one circle corresponding to the correct answer. If a wrong circle is filled, it will amount to a wrong answer and therefore quarter mark will be deducted. **If more than one circle is filled against one question number, then one full mark will automatically get deducted. The candidate is advised to take extra precaution while filling the circles on the bottom portion.**

The scanner is so sensitive to black and blue ink shades that even a slight residual ink mark or an unintended ink dot within a circle will be taken by it, as filled. Consequently the candidate may lose marks. Please do not make any stray pen marks on the answer sheets. As the scoring done by the scanner and the computer in tandem is final, a plea for erasing or neglecting the ink mark on a circle cannot be entertained.

Darken only one circle for each question as shown in the diagram:

THINK BEFORE YOU INK !

Once you darken a circle with ball point pen, there is no way to erase or to remove it. That way your decision about a correct answer will be final. The invigilator will not permit you to use marker, white fluid or any other device to hide the shading already done and you will not be supplied with one more set of OMR sheet. If you spoil a sheet in your attempt to rub off the shading done on a circle, you may ruin your opportunities. If two circles are shaded in a row and even if one of the circles is partially rubbed off, the scanner machine will take it as a multiple attempt and later the computer will deduct one mark. Think twice before you shade a circle with ink.

DON'T BLINK AFTER YOU INK !

4. THE PURPOSE AND USE OF OPTICAL MARK READER (OMR) ANSWER SHEETS AND THE SCANNER

The Optical Mark Reader (OMR) sheets are used in order to simplify the procedure of valuation of the answer papers and also to ensure highest accuracy. The correct and wrong answers to the objective type questions are not manually counted but are accounted for by making use of an imported electronic scanner. Each round spot or the circle on the OMR sheet has an alphabetical or a numerical value. So, a small mistake in shading the round spot or the circle may make a vast difference.

The scanner is a highly sensitive machine and is capable of spotting any blue or black ink mark made on the OMR sheets while they pass through it. When the OMR answer sheets pass through the scanner, it identifies the filled circles and transfers the data to a computer. The scanner is capable of scanning about 2000 sheets in an hour. The entire operation of scanning of the answer papers normally takes a few days. The scanner will only transfer the data, as it is, from the OMR answer sheets to the computer, but it will not identify the correct answers and value it.

64 OMR answer sheets corresponding to $16 \times 4 = 64$ versions containing the correct answers will be scanned only on the last day and transferred to the computer. As a final step, the computer which is programmed to score the correct answers and deduct marks for the wrong ones will in the first place, score and then assign ranks.

5. DETERMINATION OF MERIT AND PUBLICATION OF RESULTS

(A) Determination of Merit :

(1) **For Government seats :** The merit of the candidates who satisfy any of the conditions laid down under Item - 7 of Chapter - I of the brochure (except those who have passed the qualifying examination from a University or Board or any other institution located outside India), who are eligible and are seeking a professional seat, will be determined by taking the marks obtained in the Entrance Test and optional subjects in the Qualifying Examination in equal proportions.

(2) The merit of the candidates from outside Karnataka who do not satisfy any of the conditions laid down under Item - 7 of Chapter - I of the brochure, will be determined solely on the basis of marks obtained by them in the Common Entrance Test - 2003.

(3) For the candidates claiming eligibility for Government seats, where the merit of two or more candidates is the same, the interse merit will be determined with reference to the marks obtained in the Common Entrance Test in Mathematics in the case of Engineering, Technology and Architecture courses and in Biology in the case of Medical, Dental, Indian System of Medicine and Homoeopathy courses and where the marks obtained in such cases are equal then the interse merit will be determined on the basis of the marks obtained in Physics in the case of Engineering, Technology and Architecture courses and in Chemistry in the case of Medical, Dental, Indian System of Medicine and Homoeopathy courses and where the marks obtained are equal again the interse merit will be determined on the basis of the marks obtained in respective subjects in the qualifying examination as stipulated above and where marks obtained are equal again, the interse merit will be determined on the basis of the age of the candidate, the older candidate placed above the younger.

(4) In case of candidates who do not satisfy any of the conditions laid down under Item - 7 of Chapter - I of the brochure, where the merit of two or more candidates is the same, the interse merit will be determined with reference to the marks obtained in the Entrance Test in Mathematics in the case of Engineering, Technology and Architecture courses and in Biology in the case of Medical, Dental, Indian System of Medicine and Homoeopathy courses and where the marks obtained in such cases are equal then the interse merit will be determined on the basis of the marks obtained in Physics in the case of Engineering, Technology and Architecture courses and in Chemistry in the case of Medical, Dental, Indian System of Medicine and Homoeopathy courses and where the marks obtained are equal again, the interse merit will be determined on the basis of the age of the candidate, the older being placed above the younger.

(4) The interse merit determined under sub-rule (1) of Rule - 6 is the interse merit as shown in the general merit list will be the basis for the merit list of candidates claiming benefit of reservation under Rule - 11 which is detailed in Item - 8 of Chapter - I of the brochure.

(B) Publication of Results : Separate result sheets for the candidates claiming eligibility for Government seats and of those candidates who do not satisfy any of the eligibility criteria for Government seats (outside Karnataka candidates) will be prepared. Separate lists of Engineering and Medical ranks and the list of candidates whose results have been with-held and the reasons for with-holding the results will be published on **30-06-2003** in all CET exam centres and the same will also be made available on the **CET Website: <http://kar.nic.in/cet>**.

Results will not be displayed in the CET Cell premises nor will be published in the new papers.

Candidates who have any objections in respect of any entries or problems such as discrepancy in the Q. E. marks, register number, version code etc., except the CET marks in the result sheets, can submit their objections or claims before **07-07-2003** and the with-held results will be published on **10-07-2003**.

Request for re-totalling or revaluation will not be entertained as the valuation or scoring will be error free.



Sir, my rank is 1234 G 55. What does G 55 mean ?

After the declaration of the results, the candidates may get ranks assigned mainly for the following reasons :

1) For want of Q.E. marks, a candidate might have missed the rank. 2) A candidate might have marked the version code wrongly. 3) A candidate might have secured more than 35% / 40% but less than 45% / 50% in aggregate and may produce proof of belonging to SC/ST/Category - I at a later stage. 4) Q.E. marks may get varied due to revaluation or other wise, when corrected, a fresh ranking becomes necessary.

The CET computers are programmed to assign new ranks or fresh ranks to the candidates falling within the above said categories without disturbing the rank numbers assigned to the candidates whose results were declared earlier. The computer program is such that it can assign ranks in between two integers without altering the previous rank numbers. Undoubtedly, you were assigned a rank after the declaration of the results. When a rank was assigned to you, rank 1234 and 1235 had been assigned to two other candidates. When it came to assigning a rank to you, the computer found that in the normal course, your rank would have been after the rank of the candidate with rank 1234 and before the rank of the candidate with rank 1235. Therefore, the computer had to place you between 1234 and 1235.

As already said, the computer is programmed to generate large number of ranks between two integers by dividing the space alphabetically from A to Z. Then each alphabet is subdivided from 1 to 99. Now, if a new rank is required to be assigned between two integer ranks, in the first instance, the computer assigns a division number as 'G 55' before the previous rank. If one more rank needs to be assigned between the rank 1234 and 1234 G 55, the computer assigns a rank as 1234 G 44. If one more rank is to be assigned between 1234 G 55 and 1235, then it assigns a rank as 1234 G 66.

This explains the assignment of a rank to you subsequent to the declaration of the results.

**Do you doubt any candidate's
performance ?
Please do not hesitate to challenge.**

Transparency has been our motto. We have not hidden anything except the question papers. If you had seen our result sheets of the previous exams published all over the country, you would have found the candidate's number, name, caste-category, scoring in the Q.E. and also scoring in the CET with version - codes and the ranks assigned. We disclosed the scoring or the marks secured in the CET in the result sheets not only to assure the concerned candidates but also to make the world know about a candidate's performance so that if anybody had any serious doubt, the same could be brought to our notice or could be questioned in a court of law.

In spite of all these efforts, we have come across reckless and unfounded allegations that candidates might have been helped unlawfully by the CET Cell. *We want to plug even the slightest scope for such doubts and misconceptions in the minds of the people. In furtherance of our motto, we have gone one more step forward in the direction of transparency.* In order to achieve this, we have decided to allow any candidate or a parent to challenge the results or scoring of any other candidate. The candidate or parent who wants to challenge the results of another candidate should submit a petition giving out the following details about the candidate whose performance or results he suspects :1) Name of the Candidate, 2) CET admission ticket no., 3) Medical/ Engineering ranks, 4) Subject in which the foul play is suspected, 5) Nature of the foul play suspected, 6) Names of the officials / non-officials suspected to be involved in the crime, 7) Any details the petitioner feels necessary.

The petition should accompany a Demand Draft for Rs. 500/- drawn in favour of "The Special Officer, CET Cell, Bangalore" payable at Bangalore. Upon receipt of such a petition, an investigation will be launched immediately thereafterwards. At this juncture, the petitioner will be allowed to inspect any of the documents relating to the suspect candidate, such as application form, admission ticket, answer script, nominal roll, etc. The findings will be made known to petitioner soon after the completion of the investigation.

If the allegation is proved, the amount of Rs.500/- will be refunded to the petitioner and proper action in accordance with law will be initiated against the delinquent candidate and the officials responsible for the offence. If it is found that the allegation was reckless and unfounded, then the amount will be forfeited in favour of the CET Cell.

Important points to be noted prominently by the candidates appearing for the Common Entrance Test - 2003

1. Before filling the 'CET - 2003' application form, read the itemwise instructions detailed in Item - 5 of Chapter - I of the brochure carefully. Fill the application form using a ball point pen ONLY.
2. Before claiming eligibility for Government seats, make sure that you can satisfy any one of the clauses detailed in Item - 7 of Chapter - I of the brochure at Pages - 8 and 9.
3. Except the Clause code (Item - 15 of the application form), fill all the particulars in the application form preferably in Capital Letters.
4. Mention the PUC Student Number properly in Item - 17 of the application form.
5. Paste your recent passport size photograph, preferably a black & white, on the application form and make sure that it is not covering the signature area below it.
6. If you are claiming eligibility under rural quota, ascertain that you have studied 10 full academic years between 1st and 10th standard in a place other than the places mentioned in **Appendix - IV**.
7. Do not forget to sign on both the places in the application form.
8. If you have submitted the filled application form through schools & colleges, you should collect the admission ticket for 'CET - 2003' through the respective schools & colleges.
9. If you have submitted the filled application form by post directly to CET Cell, you will get the admission ticket for 'CET - 2003' by 'Speed Post' to your home address as furnished in the application form. Those candidates who do not receive the 'CET - 2003' admission tickets should invariably contact the CET Cell on or before **24-05-2003**.
10. You will be assigned an examination centre for 'CET - 2003', in the same district where you have appeared for 12th Standard / II PUC within the State of Karnataka.
11. If you have passed the qualifying examination from outside the state of Karnataka, then you can appear for CET - 2003 only in Bangalore, Belgaum, Bellary, Bidar, Gulbarga, Mangalore, Mysore, Raichur or Bidar. (Refer **Appendix - I** of the brochure at Page - 18.) If you mention a place name other than the above said nine places, you will be assigned a test centre in Bangalore.
12. If you are interested in opting for Architecture course, you are required to pass an APTITUDE TEST conducted by CET Cell only in Bangalore on **02-06-2003** between 3.00 p.m. to 4.30 p.m. If you are not interested in opting for Architecture course, you need not appear for the Aptitude Test.
13. Take special precautions while writing your CET No. and Question Booklet Version Code in the OMR Answer Sheet and also while shading the corresponding circles using a blue or black ink ball point pen.

A NOTE ON THE POST EXAMINATION PROCESS

In compliance with the orders passed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court of India on 31.10.2002 in T. M. A. Pai Foundation case, the details of seats available for allotment by the CET Cell is being worked out and suitable modifications are being made for the existing Admission rules. Therefore, a separate booklet containing the relevant portions of the amended rules and the modified procedure of seat selection process etc., will be issued to all the candidates when they come for writing the Common Entrance Test 2003, through their respective CET examination centres.

01. Availability of seats (Seat matrix)
02. Stages and procedure of selection of Government seats by the candidates
03. Fee structure
04. Schedule for submitting the Special category certificates
05. Documents to be produced for seat selection process
06. Professional colleges information
07. Schedule of seat selection process

BEWARE OF CHEATS

Persons claiming rapport with the Officials of the CET Cell may promise to get a course and college of the student's choice and on that pretext may collect money, WE WOULD LIKE TO ASSERT THAT SUCH A THING IS NOT POSSIBLE. A student is allowed to select a course and college from among the available on the electronic display board, when he comes for seat selection process in the presence of hundreds of people seated in the hall. The opportunity to make such a selection will be given strictly in the order of his ranking which will be published in the result sheets. The ranking in turn is based on the marks scored by him in the CET and the qualifying examination. Even these marks will be published in the result sheets. In short, position of a student in the rank list is fixed and made known to all. Once the position is fixed, choice of college and course as already explained, will depend upon his merit and to some extent on his luck. How can anybody change these things even if lakhs of rupees are paid? Before you succumb to the promises of a cheat think twice! If you think that you can get the things done unlawfully, you are bound to lose!

The Modus operandi of the cheats:

As we understand a cheat who makes promises of getting a seat unlawfully will visit the CET Cell premises a few times pretending to be a parent or guardian of a student and familiarises himself with one or two staff members. On the day of seat selection he will ask the student to whom he has made the promise to stand at distance and he will approach the Officials with whom he has struck familiarity and will exchange few pleasantries or will make an encouraging comment such as "Sir, You really work very hard, etc.," and will get a response in the form of a smile or a few words. Thereupon he will go to the student and tell that he has spoken to the concerned person and that the matter has been taken care of. If the student gets a good seat out of his merit and luck, the cheat will say that he arranged the seat. If he loses, the cheat will claim that he did his best but didn't succeed.
